Table notes

Some 220 points separate the top programme, at the Kellogg/HKUST Business School, from the school ranked 100. The schools are divided into four tiers. Business schools in tiers I and II score above the average for the cohort, and tiers III and IV are below it. The difference in scores between schools ranked consecutively is greater within tiers I and IV than in tiers II and III. Tier I includes 13 schools from Kellogg/HKUST Business School to London Business School. Tier II includes schools from UCLA Anderson/National University of Singapore, ranked 14, to New York University Stern in 42nd position. Tier III, headed by Rotterdam School of Management, Erasmus University, spans schools ranked 43 to 78. Tier IV includes schools from Rutgers Business School in joint 79th place to Politecnico di Milano School of Management at 100.
